A Brief History of the University of Waikato Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato

The University had its genesis in 1956, when a small group of visionary individuals began working towards the founding of a university for the people of the South Auckland region. A college, a sub-branch of Auckland University, was established in 1959 and in 1965, after opening its doors in 1964, the University of Waikato was officially opened by the then Governor-General, Sir Bernard Fergusson (later Lord Ballantrae).

From these modest beginnings, on what was largely farmland and with only a handful of temporary buildings and staff, the University of Waikato now provides around 205 qualifications to a student population of approximately 13,000, of whom more than 4,800 complete a qualification annually. Today, the University employs approximately 1,560 full-time equivalent staff and makes a significant contribution to the local economy.

The University of Waikato celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2004. This important milestone was accompanied by significant change - we mourned the death of our Foundation Vice-Chancellor, Professor Don Llewellyn, and farewelled our third Vice-Chancellor, Professor Bryan Gould, who retired after ten years in the post. With great optimism and a focus on the future, we commenced the next chapter of our history by welcoming our fourth Vice-Chancellor, Professor Roy Crawford, at the beginning of 2005.

Our focus on the future was quickly cemented, as we embarked on the development and delivery of an ambitious Vision for the period 2005 – 2015. The key themes of our new Vision are Excellence, Distinctiveness and International Connectedness. We are committed to delivering a world-class education and research portfolio, providing a full and dynamic university experience which is distinctive in character, and pursuing strong international linkages to advance knowledge. The Vision articulates a strong framework which will define our fifth decade, presenting us with many exciting challenges and opportunities.

We play an essential leadership role in the prosperity of our region, which we define in terms of the tribal boundaries of the 16 iwi affiliated to Te Rōpu Manukura. It extends from Manukau down to Wanganui, across to Kahungunu, along the East Coast up to Hikurangi, continuing up to the Bay of Plenty, to the Coromandel and back to Manukau. We sit at the heart of a community of strong regional partnerships and take pride in the extent to which we reflect and serve the strengths and interests of our region.

Our quality Hamilton campus environment, with grounds covering an area of 65 hectares, continues to be a source of community pride. The grounds include sports fields, walkways, three lakes and extensive gardens. Great care is taken to maintain the beautiful grounds, while also developing the built environment to accommodate the University's growing needs.

As part of its new Vision, the University will promote the concept of a full university experience, which is more than just the accumulation of knowledge. Through a range of campus development and related strategies, it will enhance the entire intellectual, cultural, political, social and recreational life that students enjoy while enrolled.

The Hamilton campus is home to the WEL Energy Trust Academy of Performing Arts, a high-technology facility for the performance of drama, music, dance and Māori and other cultural performing arts. It is, at the same time, a vital teaching facility for the University, and a world-class performance venue, which has been welcomed by the Hamilton and wider Waikato communities who share it. Such is its great success that additions and extensions are being planned.

We are committed to increasing both the tertiary participation rate of our regional population overall, as well as the proportions of new school-leavers and postgraduate students. We are also committed to ensuring the ongoing relevance of the programmes we offer, and the effectiveness of our delivery of them. The University continues to deliver programmes in various locations throughout our region and more than 20 of our qualifications are available entirely or mostly through online study.

The University of Waikato has a campus at Tauranga and a strong relationship with the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic. The collaborative arrangements enjoyed by both institutions include the sharing of resources and services and joint provision of professional development and training opportunities for staff. Credit transfer arrangements between the two institutions are well-established.

The University has recently reaffirmed its commitment to the community in the Bay of Plenty and to sustaining that commitment in a manner that is focused and directly aligned with its new Vision and its role as one of the key drivers of economic growth in the region. With this in mind, the University will align itself with the region's economic and growth strategies as a means of ensuring that its own strategies are co-ordinated and integrated with those of the Bay of Plenty community.

Co-operation and collaboration are fundamental principles to the way the University of Waikato operates. We are a member of the Tertiary Education Alliance, alongside the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic, Tairāwhiti Polytechnic, Waiariki Institute of Technology, Western Institute of Technology and Wintec. This alliance is a highly successful example of a co-operative approach to education planning and provision. It provides clear academic pathways through agreed articulation, credit and contractual teaching arrangements, and as a result, students in the region can take advantage of a variety of tertiary opportunities that would not otherwise be so accessible.

We adhere to the concept of a university education that is, by definition, research-led. Through sustained research intensity and the attraction of high levels of external funding from public sector and industry sources, we aim to maintain a highly competitive research profile. Our staff participate in a wide range of research consortia, clusters and multi-institutional research teams locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. Located close to a recently established Innovation Park, we are exceptionally well-placed to contribute to the local and national economies by enhancing business capability in the region and increasing opportunities for the commercialisation of intellectual property.

We continue to foster a culture of internationalisation, measured through the diversity of our student and staff profiles, the support and celebration of that diversity, a long-standing pride in our reputation for the pastoral care of our international students, and the measures we take through curriculum, programme design and our global networks and connections to international influences.

From its inception the University has always been at the forefront of initiatives in support of Māori aspirations. Sir Bernard Fergusson made a deep and lasting impression with his message at the official opening of the University, saying that Waikato was "the first of the New Zealand universities to be planted right in the heart of traditionally Māori country". Since our foundation, we have worked closely with local iwi, particularly Tainui, to make the University accessible to Māori students and to foster an environment of success. Today we are proud to have the highest proportion of Māori students of any New Zealand university.

As part of our role in relation to life-long learning, the University's Centre for Continuing Education delivers each year, both in Hamilton and Tauranga, an adult and community education programme that draws heavily on university scholarship and expertise. We have always regarded our community education programmes as a very important and valuable dimension of our academic provision, a significant dimension of our Charter commitments to our region, to equity of access and to kaupapa and tikanga Māori.

We are proud of our evolution into a truly New Zealand institution which, as our motto reflects, supports our country's nation-building policies and reflects our nation's identity.

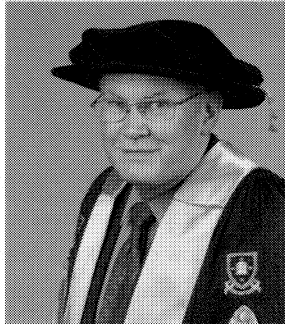

University Officers' Profiles

Chancellor

Mr John Jackman B.Ag.Sci Lincoln



John Jackman was raised on a sheep and cropping farm at Cheviot, North Canterbury. He graduated in Agricultural Science from Lincoln College and joined the then Department of Agriculture in Hamilton in 1968.

Initially a financial adviser to the farming sector, he became involved in major change situations – initially in farming but this soon extended into new technologies and agricultural policy. He played significant roles both in implementing and dismantling the Government interventions in agriculture of the 70's and 80's. During this time he also took a 4-year overseas posting as Counsellor (Agriculture) at the NZ High Commission, London.

He returned from overseas to a position in the Directorate General of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries where he was at the interface between the Ministry and the Minister. In 1987 the MAF undertook a major restructuring and with it John changed his career path. He moved from Head Office to a frontline regional role and was then promoted to Director of North Region of MAFTech based at Ruakura with responsibility for 40 percent of MAF's research and consultancy. This was a period of intense entrepreneurial activity as science and advisory services sought to become commercially viable. The next step was the formation of the Crown Research Institutes. John convened the establishment unit for AgResearch – the largest CRI. He was appointed foundation Deputy CEO of AgResearch.

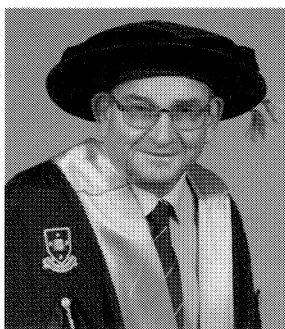
John resigned from AgResearch in 1995 to form a consultancy practice under the name of Foresight Consultancy. He undertook overseas assignments for the World Bank, however his primary interest lay with the Waikato Innovation Park and related projects.

In 2000 he was appointed to the Council of the University of Waikato as a Government nominee.

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Pro Chancellor

Dr Brian Linehan ED MB ChB Otago Dip Obst Auckland FRCPA



Dr Linehan was born in Te Awamutu and raised on a dairy farm. He received his secondary school education in Auckland and completed his undergraduate degrees in Dunedin before undertaking postgraduate studies in Auckland, Sydney and Birmingham.

In 1971 he returned to the Waikato and entered into a partnership at Medlab Hamilton as well as taking up a Consultancy position at Waikato Hospital as Chemical Pathologist. Subsequently he became Managing Director of Medlab Hamilton but retired from Pathology in 2004.

Brian was an elected member of the Waikato Hospital Board and the Waikato Area Health Board until its disestablishment in 1991. During that time he served as Chairperson of the Policy and Initiatives Committee. He was also Chairman of IANZ, (previously TELARC) the statutory body for accreditation in New Zealand, from 1987 until 1998.

In 1980 he was elected President of the New Zealand Society of Pathologists and for a number of years acted as an examiner in chemical pathology for the Royal Australasian College of Pathologists. He also served in a variety of executive roles for the New Zealand Medical Association including a term as Chairman from 1996 to 1998. In addition he was Chairman of the Confederation of Medical Associations in Asia and Oceania (CMAAO) from 1997 to 1999.

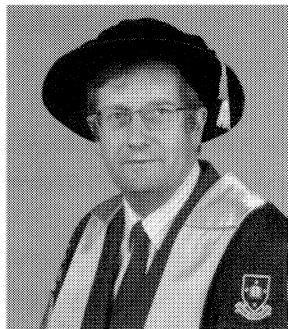
Brian served for 22 years in the New Zealand Territorial Forces, attaining the position of Assistant Director of Medical Services (ADMS) of New Zealand Land Forces, with the rank of Colonel.

He is a current member of the Institute of Directors and the NZMA Ethics Committee.

Brian was appointed to the Council of the University in 2002 and was elected as Pro Chancellor in 2006. He serves on the University's Finance, Risk Management and Human Research Ethics Committees and the recently-formed Planning and Resources Committee.

Professor Roy Crawford BSc(Hons) PhD DSc Belfast FIMechE FIMMM FREng

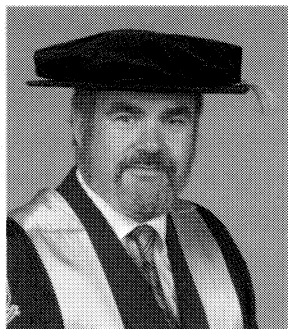


Professor Crawford was born in Lisburn, Northern Ireland and has spent most of his academic and professional life in Northern Ireland. He is a Professor of Mechanical Engineering, whose primary research interest has been in the mechanical properties and processing behaviour of plastics. From 1999 - 2001 he was Professor of Mechanical Engineering at the University of Auckland, and has on-going research and business interests in New Zealand associated with the establishment of a new polymer research centre. His previous position was the Senior Pro Vice-Chancellor at Queen's University, Belfast, with special responsibility for Research and Development.

Professor Crawford has been a senior member of a small team that manages all aspects of Queen's University. He has published seven books and over two hundred and seventy papers and has been a member of numerous government panels and research grant committees in the UK. He is a member of a number of professional organisations and a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering. He is directly involved in a wide range of professional activities and organisations, including consultancies and company directorships.

Deputy Vice-Chancellor

Professor Doug Sutton BA MA PhD Otago

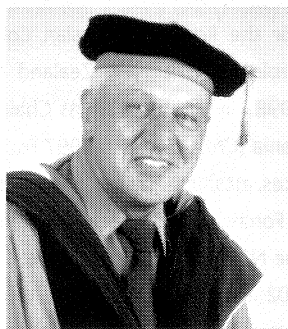


Professor Sutton was born and raised in Southland, attending school there before proceeding to the University of Otago. Degrees there in Arts, Anthropology and Archaeology led to research in the Smithsonian Institute and a teaching post at the University of British Columbia, then appointment to the Anthropology Department of the University of Auckland. There he was promoted to a personal Chair, as co-founder of the Centre for Archaeological Research and instigator of a series of interdisciplinary research programmes, with support from the Marsden Fund, the Foundation of Research, Science and Technology and a range of other funding agencies. He served as Dean of Arts in the University of Auckland from 1997 until 2002. The Faculty was successful during that period in increasing research and creative work, in broadening and diversifying the range of agencies and philanthropists from whom it received support and in marshalling some considerable initiatives, including those which led to the formation of the School of Creative and Performing Arts, various new departments and a range of research centres and other intellectual foci.

His recent move to the Waikato builds logically on previous experience, bringing with it a commitment to the further growth of the University as a provider of distinguished education, across a comprehensive range of research-based disciplines and interdisciplinary programmes, which will bring value to the region and New Zealand more broadly. That value will affect prosperity and wealth creation in the economy of the Waikato and Bay of Plenty, while also adding to the diversity and value of cultural and intellectual life of the communities.

Pro Vice-Chancellor (Māori)

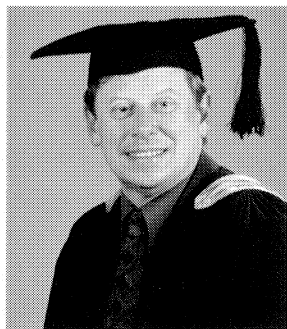
Professor Tamati Reedy BA MA Auckland MA PhD Hawai'i



Professor Reedy is the Pro Vice-Chancellor with responsibilities for Māori development in the University and Professor of Māori Sustainable Enterprise with the Waikato Management School. Professor Reedy was the foundation Dean and Professor of the School of Māori and Pacific Development at the University of Waikato, created in 1996. Professor Reedy gained his MA in English at Auckland University, and an MA and Doctorate in Linguistics at the University of Hawai'i. He was also a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Alabama. Prior to his appointment as Dean in 1996, Professor Reedy was the Chief Executive and Secretary for the Māori Affairs Department, New Zealand. He was awarded the 1990 New Zealand Medal. With his wife Tilly, he has managed his own consultancy business in education and training in the public and private sector until his appointment at Waikato University. He is Ngāti Porou.

Associate Professor Alan Neilson BSocSc MSocSc Waikato MSc York (UK)

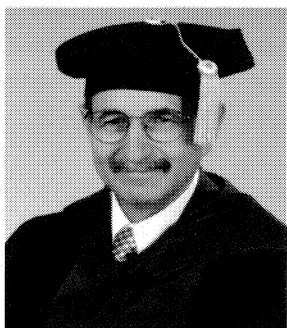


Associate Professor Neilson was educated at Tauranga Boys' College, the University of Waikato and the University of York (UK).

Professor Daniel Zirker BA MA Montana PhD Alberta

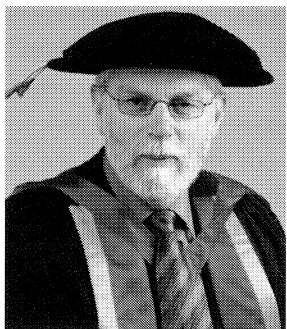


Professor Zirker previously served as the Dean of Arts and Sciences at Montana State University, Billings from 1998-2004, Professor of Political Science and various administrative positions at the University of Idaho from 1985-1998, and Assistant Professor of Political Science at Minnesota State University, Mankato from 1983-85. From 1999 to 2005 he held the position of the chair/president, and since 2005, Executive Director, of the Research Committee on Armed Forces and Society of the International Political Science Association. A former U.S. Peace Corps volunteer in Northeast Brazil from 1970-1972, he was a Fulbright senior lecturer at the University of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania in East Africa during the 1989-1990 academic year. He has published in academic books and journals on democratisation, economic development and civil-military relations in Brazil as well as in Africa and Eastern Europe.

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Dean of Computing and Mathematical Sciences

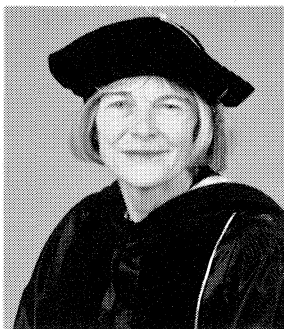
Professor Mark Apperley BE PhD Auckland FNZCS



Professor Apperley was appointed to the position of Dean of Computing and Mathematical Sciences in 2003. He began his academic career in electrical engineering but after completing his PhD at Auckland University, and a period of post-doctoral research at Imperial College in London, he returned to New Zealand in 1975 to take up a lectureship in Computer Science at the University of Waikato. In 1985 he became Professor and Head of the Computer Science Department at Massey University. He returned to Waikato University in 1994 as Chair of the Department. He has been very active in research in the areas of human-computer interaction and information visualisation throughout his academic career, and has published extensively on these topics. He is a Fellow of the New Zealand Computer Society.

Dean of Education

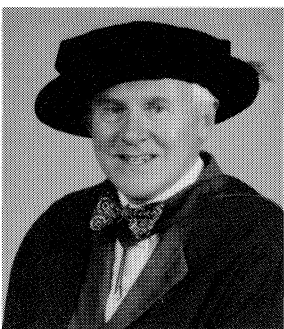
Professor Noeline Alcorn QSO BA *Victoria* MA *Canterbury* PhD *California* DipEd *Massey* DipT *FNZEAS*



Professor Alcorn taught in New Zealand secondary schools for some years before undertaking her doctoral study at the University of California. She held lecturing and management positions at Auckland Teachers' College and was the Director of the Centre for Continuing Education at the University of Auckland before taking up her current position as Dean of the School of Education. Professor Alcorn was Chairperson of the New Zealand Council for Educational Research from 1988 until 1993, and was awarded the Suffrage Medal in 1993. She is a Fellow of the New Zealand Educational Administration Society. Professor Alcorn has published widely in children's literature, school principalship and action research, including a biography of C.E. Beeby. She is the inaugural chair of the Teacher Education Forum of Aotearoa New Zealand and current chair of the Performance Based Research Fund (PBRF) education panel.

Professor John Farrar LLB (Hons) LLM LLD *London* PhD *Bristol*

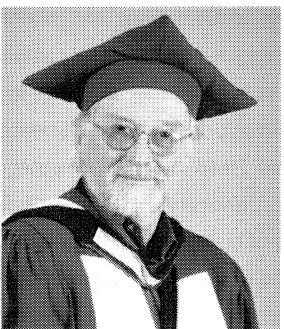


Professor Farrar joined the University of Waikato in 2004 as Dean of the School of Law. He was formerly Dean of Law at the University of Canterbury and Dean of Law and Acting Vice-Chancellor at Bond University, Queensland. He is an Emeritus Professor of Law, Bond University, and a Professorial Fellow, University of Melbourne.

Professor Farrar is a member of the Legislation Advisory Committee and has been a consultant to the Business Council of Australia, Australian Institute of Company Directors, IFSA and New Zealand Treasury. He set up Community Legal Advice Centres in Bristol, Christchurch and the Gold Coast. He has experience in Company Law, Corporate Governance and Insolvency.

A specialist in the areas of performance, organization theory and auditing Professor Pratt joined the University of Waikato in 1990 as Dean of the Waikato Management School. He was previously Professor and Head of Department of Accounting at Massey University. With extensive industry experience Professor Pratt is currently involved in researching peak performing organisations. He has published eight books and more than one hundred journal and conference papers. He advises the CEOs and top management teams of several leading global corporations in the USA and Europe on inspiration, peak performance, and value creation.

Professor G. R. Aroha Yates-Smith BA MA PhD Waikato DipT Hamilton Teachers' College

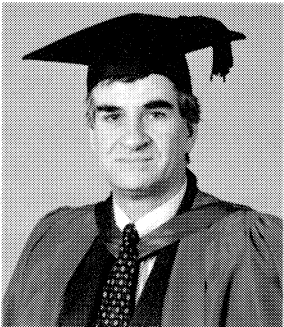


He uri tēnei nō ngā iwi i heke mai ai i runga i ngā waka o Te Arawa, o Tainui, o Takitimu, o Horouta, me ngā iwi hoki i take mai nei i te whenua nei, i te Ūkaipō.

Professor Yates-Smith is the Dean of Te Pua Wānanga ki te Ao, the School of Māori and Pacific Development. She completed her BA, MA, and PhD at the University of Waikato, and her Diploma of Teaching at the Hamilton Teachers' College. Aroha entered this University as a Junior Lecturer in 1986, after having taught Māori and German at Hillcrest High School. She held a Fulbright Scholarship at the University of Hawai'i, at Manoa in 1992 and in 1999 became the first PhD graduate from Te Pua Wānanga ki te Ao. She was the recipient of Te Rangi Hiroa (Sir Peter Buck) medal in 2003 for her analysis of the role of women in pre-contact Māori society. Professor Yates-Smith's research interests lie in the study of the feminine in Māori society and Māori spirituality.

Dean of Science and Engineering

Professor Richard Price BSc (Hons) Australian National University PhD Otago



After 24 years on the academic staff of La Trobe University in Melbourne, Australia, Professor Price joined the University of Waikato as Dean of the School of Science and Engineering in 1998. He gained his bachelors degree in geology from Australian National University, and was awarded his doctorate from Otago University in 1974. His major research interests include the application of trace element, major element and isotope geochemistry to geological problems throughout Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific. With a distinguished academic and publishing record to his credit, Professor Price is currently involved in a co-operative research project studying the geology of Mounts Ruapehu and Taranaki with academic colleagues from Auckland, Victoria and Massey Universities, University College, Cork (Ireland) and Macquarie University (Australia).

The University Crest

The motto, Ko Te Tangata, means 'For the People' and reflects the University's philosophy that people are central to the institution and its most valued resource. The outside red border is a stylised fern frond or pitau that symbolises new birth, growth, vitality, strength and achievement. Inside the border is the University's coat of arms. The open book surrounded by the four stars of the Southern Cross is a symbol of learning. The crest design is in the University's colours of black, red and gold.

Ceremonial Traditions

Elements of university graduation ceremonies have evolved from the 12th century when the first universities emerged in Europe. The organisation of medieval universities was modelled on the established institutions of the day – the church, the monastery, and the guild.

Latin was the language used by medieval scholars, and it is from Latin that the words 'university' and 'degree' are derived. The Latin term universitas means a guild or union and universities started as a scholastic guild – a self-constituted community of teachers and scholars.

The word graduate comes from the Latin word gradus, which means step. Admission to study a bachelors degree was the first step taken towards completing a university education. The second step was to become a 'master'. Masters were Master of Arts graduates whose degrees licensed them to teach. The Chancellor, an officer of the cathedral, originally granted teaching licences.

Ceremonial Robes



The academic gowns and hoods worn by graduates and University staff today are fashioned on everyday medieval garments.

In the Middle Ages the corporate existence of universities was recognised and sanctioned by civil or ecclesiastical authority. The regalia worn by graduates and university staff today reflect this mix of medieval governance. Robes worn by the Chancellor resemble those worn by the Lord Chancellor of England. Graduates and academic staff wear gowns similar to the dress of medieval clergy. Hoods are also fashioned on an everyday medieval garment, although the coloured lining was a later addition to indicate the wearer's university and degree.

University of Waikato Academic Dress

Academic regalia are as follows:

First Bachelors: Black gown; black hood with gold lining; black mortarboard.

Bachelors with Honours: Black gown; black hood with gold lining and gold border 5cm in width; black mortarboard.

Masters: Black gown; gold hood with gold lining; black mortarboard.

MPhil: Black gown; crimson hood with crimson lining; black mortarboard.

PhD: Maroon gown; crimson hood with crimson lining; black Tudor bonnet.

DLit, DSc: Crimson gown; crimson hood with crimson lining; black Tudor bonnet with gold cord and tassel.

HonD: Crimson gown; gold hood with gold lining; black Tudor bonnet with gold cord and tassel.

Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor: Black gown with lining of gold satin; gold button and cord just above the sleeves which are also lined with gold satin; a replica of the University's coat of arms just above the gold button on the shoulder; black Tudor bonnet with gold cord and tassel.

Pro Chancellor: Black gown with lining of gold satin; gold button and cord just above the sleeves which are lined with black satin; black Tudor bonnet with gold cord and tassel.

Guest speaker: Hon. Parekura Horomia

Hon. Parekura Horomia is the Minister for Māori Affairs, and also holds Associate Minister portfolios in Social Development and Employment; Education; State Services; and Fisheries. Born in Tolaga Bay, Hon. Parekura Horomia has spent most of his working life in the East Coast region. He started as a farm and forestry labourer, then worked in the newspaper industry and became a qualified printer. He then became a civil servant with the Department of Labour, and by 1988 he was the Director of its Māori Perspective Unit. In 1992, he became the General Manager of the Department of Labour's Community Employment Group, a position he held until 1998. In the 1990s he began to play a prominent role in Māori community organisations, including the Māori Wardens, the Hatea Rangī Māori Council and the Ngati Porou Te Kohanga Reo Trust Training Board. He was elected to Parliament in 1999 for the seat of Ikaroa-Rawhiti. Hon. Parekura Horomia's tribal affiliations are Ngati Porou, Te Aitanga Hauiti, Ngati Kahungunu and Ngāi Tahu.

Guest speaker: Matthew Cooper

Matthew Cooper MNZM is the CEO of Sport Waikato, an organization committed to building active communities in the greater Waikato region. Matthew was educated at Marist Brothers School and St John's College in Hastings, and had his first taste of international competition touring Britain as a member of a New Zealand school boys' rugby team in 1984. Matthew is a member of the Board of Midlands Hockey Inc, and the Waikato Institute of Leisure and Sports Studies (WILSS). He is currently participating in a pilot leadership programme run by SPARC (Sport and Recreation New Zealand) for senior executives from sport and recreation organizations. In the 2006 New Year's Honours List, Matthew became a member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to rugby and sports administration.

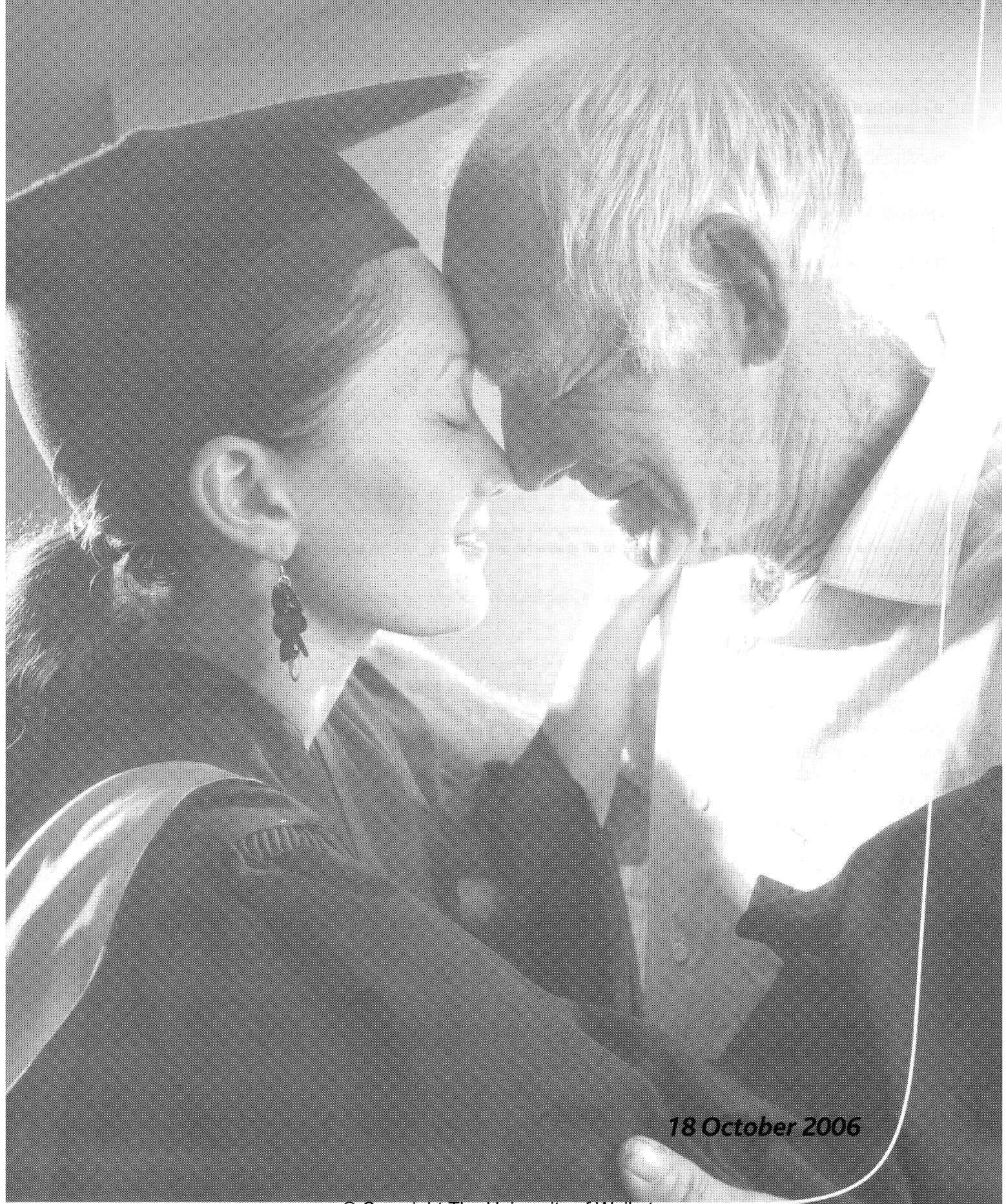

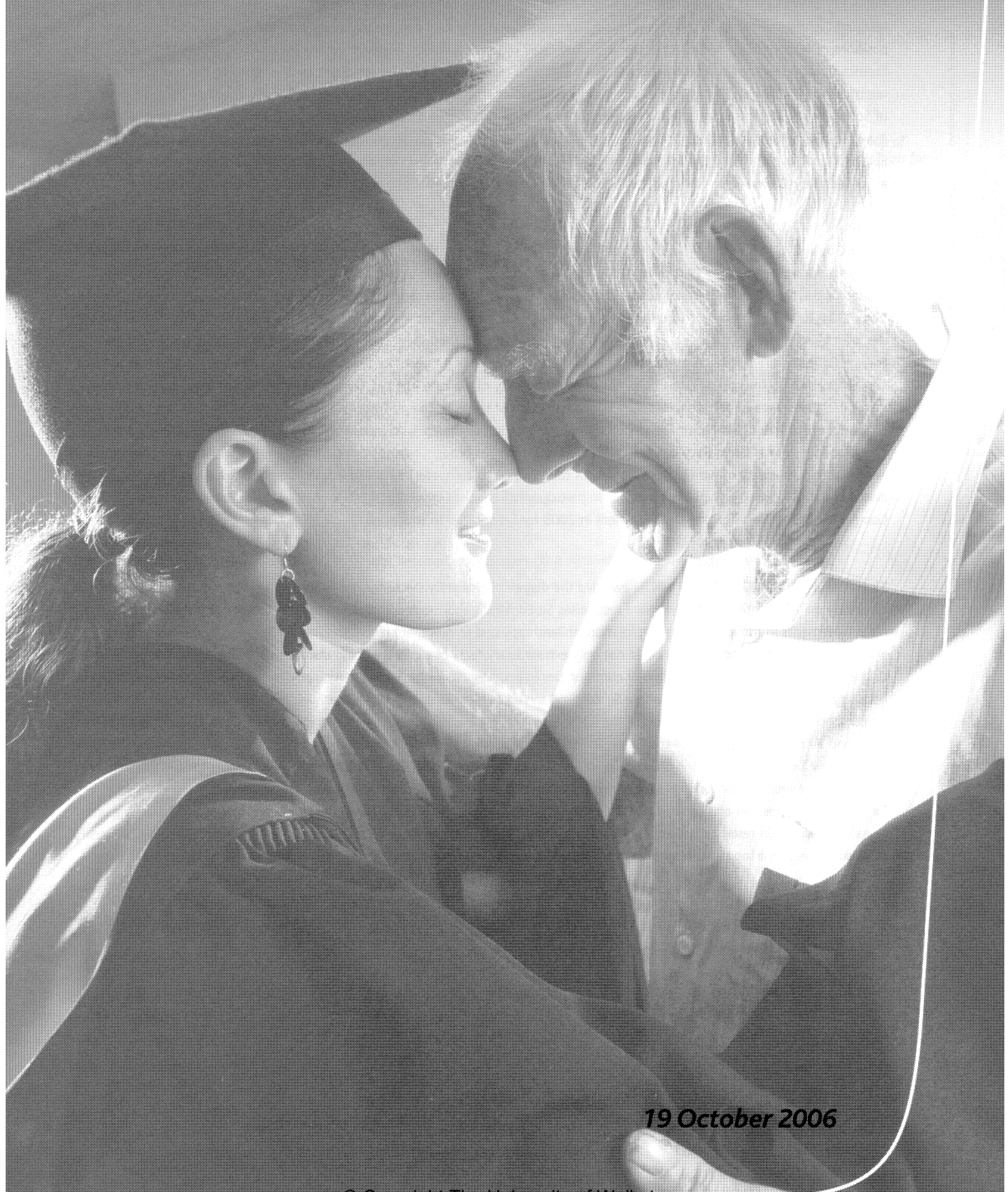

Honorary Award Recipients

Michael Hills ONZM BA MA *Victoria* PhD *Australian National University* DipT will be awarded the title Honorary Fellow of the University of Waikato at a graduation ceremony on 19 October 2006. The award recognises Michael's significant contributions to the University of Waikato as a member of its academic staff from 1972 until his retirement in 2006. As a senior lecturer in Psychology, he taught a range of papers in social psychology, cross-cultural psychology and the psychology of disability. He also held many positions of responsibility at the University, including Chair of the Psychology Department and membership of the University Council, Finance Committee and the Academic Board. The award also recognises Michael's significant contributions to the community through membership of a range of societies and organisations, including the New Zealand Psychological Society, the New Zealand Federation of Social Service Organisations, the New Zealand Neurological Foundation's Scientific Advisory Committee and the Disabled Persons' Assembly. He is highly regarded nationally and internationally for his services to persons with epilepsy, as a life member of the Epilepsy Association of New Zealand, and an active participant in the International Bureau for Epilepsy (including eight years' service as its Secretary-General). He was made an officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit in the 2002 New Year's Honours List.

Bryan Gould CNZM BA LL.M *Auckland* BCL MA *Oxford* will be awarded the degree of Honorary Doctor of the University of Waikato at a graduation ceremony on 19 October 2006. The award recognises Bryan's contribution to the international community of academia, the New Zealand tertiary education sector and, in particular, his service to the University of Waikato as its Vice-Chancellor from 1994-2004. Bryan was born in Hawera, and in 1962, after receiving his Masters of Laws at Auckland University he was awarded the prestigious Rhodes Scholarship to study at Oxford University. He then spent more than 30 years in England, working at the Foreign Office before serving as a Member of Parliament for a total of 14 years for the British Labour Party. Bryan returned to New Zealand to take up the role of Vice-Chancellor of the University of Waikato in 1994. During his leadership of the University, several major initiatives were undertaken, including the construction of the WEL Energy Trust Academy of Performing Arts, the establishment of the School of Māori and Pacific Development and the creation of the Waikato Innovation Park. In 2002, Bryan instigated the annual rowing eights "Great Race" on the Waikato River, which has brought teams from Cambridge and Oxford universities in the UK and from the University of Washington in the USA to Hamilton to compete. In 2004, a women's eight event was added, for the award of the Bryan Gould Cup, which has drawn participants from the University of Melbourne, Australia. Bryan was made a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2003 for his services to education.

Sir Edmund Hillary KG ONZ KBE will be awarded the degree of Honorary Doctor of the University of Waikato at a graduation ceremony on 19 October 2006. The award recognises Sir Edmund's enormous contribution to New Zealand and the world through his achievements in mountaineering, exploration, philanthropy and environmental conservation. Sir Edmund's many exceptional achievements are well-known and include not only extraordinary feats of exploration and discovery, but also significant contributions to the health, well-being and education of communities in poor regions of the world, particularly Nepal (which made Sir Edmund an honorary citizen in 2003) and India, where Sir Edmund served as New Zealand's High Commissioner 1985-1989. Sir Edmund was knighted in celebration of the 1953 ascent on Mt Everest. He became a Member of the Order of New Zealand in 1987 and a Knight of the Order of the Garter in 1995. His name has been given to a number of schools, organisations and activities around New Zealand. Through the prestigious Hillary Scholarships, the University of Waikato provides support to students who are pursuing excellence in sport or creative endeavours while also achieving their academic goals. Sir Edmund's interests in and commitment to environmental matters align strongly with the University of Waikato's teaching and research strengths in resource and environmental planning, ecology, and environmental conservation and restoration. The University of Waikato has had a long involvement in New Zealand's world-renowned Antarctic Research Programme centred on Scott Base, which owes much to the legacy of Sir Edmund's Antarctic explorations. Sir Edmund selected the site of Scott Base on 10 January 1957, and it was built as part of New Zealand's contribution to the International Geophysical Year. 2007 will mark the 50th anniversary of the International Geophysical Year and the University of Waikato is proud to lead up to this important anniversary with the award of this honorary doctorate to Sir Edmund Hillary.

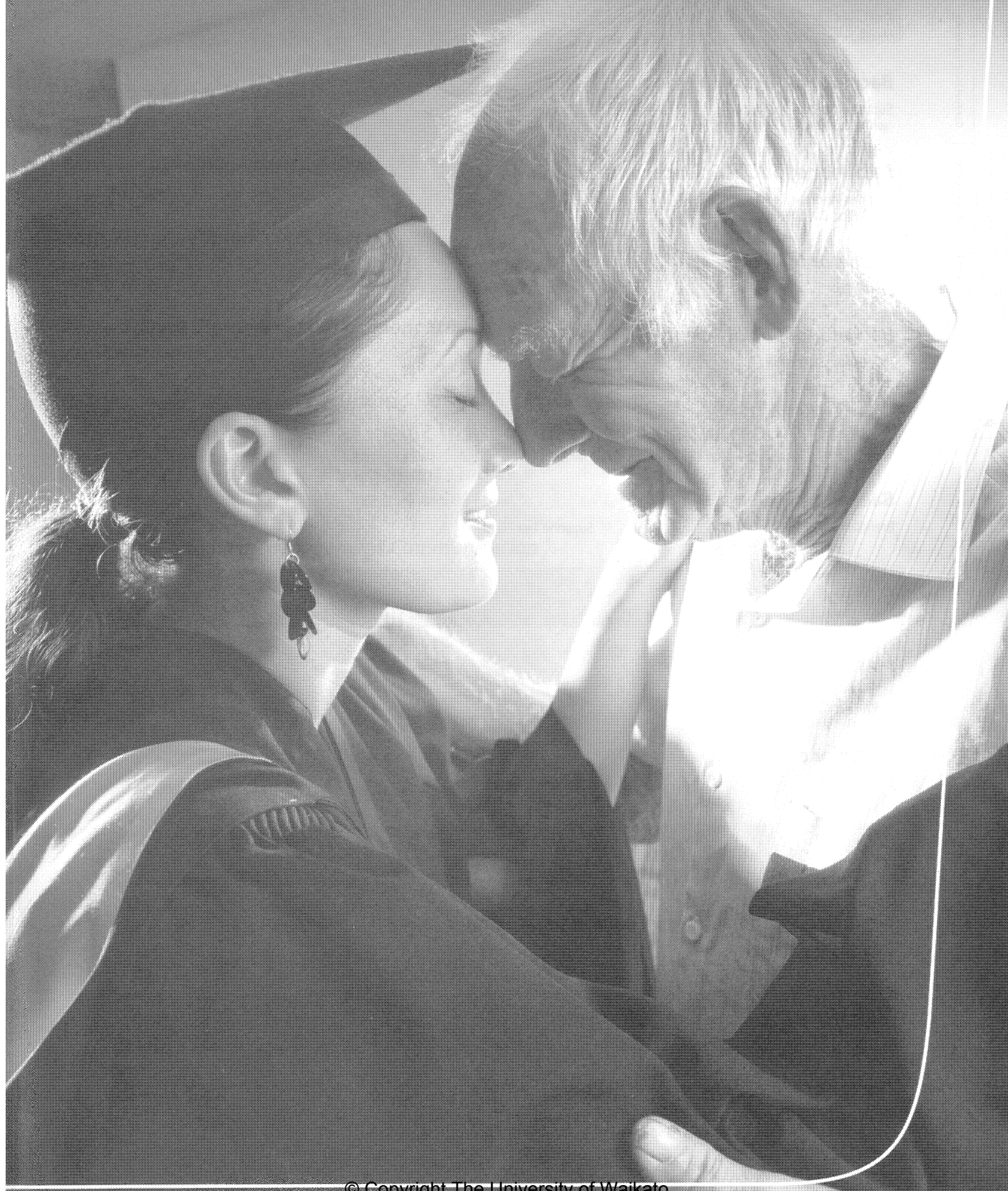
